FINANCES

HOW ARE WE FUNDED?

Reeves County Emergency Services Districts Nos. 1 & 2 primarily depend on property tax revenues to fund their operations, lacking the diverse revenue streams available to other districts and 2024, local governments. In districts adopted a tax rate of 8 cents per \$100 of property valuation. This reliance property taxes underscores importance of this revenue source for sustaining essential emergency services in the county.

WHO PAYS THE MOST?

- Single-family residential properties in Reeves County contribute less than 1% to each district's total taxable value.
- Conversely, the oil and gas industry accounts for approximately 75% of the total taxable value, generating about \$41.5 million in combined property tax revenue for the districts.
- In 2024, both Reeves County **Emergency Services Districts** 1 (Fire) and 2 (EMS) adopted a tax rate of 8 cents per \$100 of property valuation.
- Ambulance services constitute only 3% of the EMS district's annual revenue.
- Cost recovery billing contributes less than 0.25% to the Fire district's annual revenue.

TRAINING

In 2024, **ESD 1** prioritized advanced training with a strong focus on specialty disciplines.

As our community continues to grow, so does the potential for hazardous materials and rescue-related incidents. To stay prepared for these evolving challenges, ESD#1 participated in **24** specialized training courses addressing a wide range of incident types, including swift water rescue, high-angle operations, confined space rescues, structural collapse response, hazardous materials operations, and vehicle extrication.

In total, responders attended more than **2,750** hours of external training to enhance skills across multiple rescue disciplines, ensuring ESD#1 remains ready to deliver exceptional service in times of need.

In addition ESD 1 complete public Fire and Life Safety to **250** adults!



In-house training is a daily occurrence enhancing knowledge, skills, and abilities to better serve the citizens and visitors of Reeves County. In total ESD#1 personnel completed nearly **8,000** hours of internal emergency services training.



ESD 2 has delivered a comprehensive training program consisting of **37** continuing education courses that provided hundreds of hours of instruction time for our providers. Additionally, the district has conducted **8** National Programs courses totaling 92 hours of instruction time. ESD 2 has also been actively engaged in Community Education, offering several types of courses that resulted in nearly **100** certifications for community members.

In 2024 ESD 2 also had **9** team members complete training required to promote to Paramedic!









CADAVER LAB

Joint training across both Emergency Services Districts remains a top priority. In collaboration with Texas Tech University's Institute of Anatomical Sciences in Midland, personnel from both ESDs, along with partners from Reeves Regional Health, participated in hands-on critical care training. Led by our Medical Director, Dr. Justin Fairless, this training enhances our crews' capabilities in emergency care, ensuring they are prepared to provide the highest level of service to our community.

2024 FLEET ADDITIONS



MPV 9-03 This multi-patient vehicle can evacuate medical facilities during disasters and provide rehab support to our responders during extended incidents.



Tender 4 - Was acquired to support firefighting when water sources are unavailable, carrying 4000 gallons with pump and quick dump capabilities for operational support.



UTV I & II - Each District has its own multifunction all-terrain vehicle capable of supporting community events and remote incidents.



Medic 12, 23, and 33 — will add 3 more ambulances to ESD # 2's fleet and are intended to support operations in the Balmorhea response area.



Rescue 3 - This vehicle carries advanced rescue equipment that is capable of supporting on and off road missions. It will be stationed in Balmorhea.



Battalion 2 – This Battalion Chief vehicle is designed to support incident command duties and daily EMS operations.




STATION 4



Coming June 2026 - Station 4 will operate as a cutting-edge **Training Center & ESD Station** equipped with Fire Training Towers, diverse Live Fire Training Props, a Vehicle Extrication area, EMS Simulation Lab, Cadaver Lab, and a 100-person Classroom, while also providing quarters for both an Engine and Medic Companies.





AIR MEDICAL MEMBERSHIP





For the third consecutive year, ESD 2, in collaboration with our partners at Reeves Regional Health and the Town of Pecos City, has secured Medical Membership through an Air AirMedCare Network. This membership provides vital air medical transportation for any medically necessary transport to all residents and transient workers in Reeves County. Transport coverage extends from Reeves, Pecos, Ward, Jeff Davis, and Culberson Counties for all members AT NO COST!

LOOK AHEAD TO 2025

A few items we are aiming for in 2025:

Volunteer Program

We will soon launch our Volunteer Program inviting community members to serve as Emergency Responders and in other Essential Volunteer Roles. This initiative aims to bolster our emergency response capabilities and foster community resilience.

Partnerships

We will continue to collaborate with community partners and neighboring departments to enrich resilience in our community and across West Texas.

Data Driven Operations

To enhance operational safety and efficiency, we will seek ways to better leverage incident data to discern patterns and allocate resources more effectively.

Training & Specialized Response Capabilities

Aligning with the industrial growth in Reeves County is essential. We will continue to develop high-level response teams for special hazards. To enhance our team's expertise, we will strengthen our knowledge, skills, and abilities through a combination of internal and external training opportunities. This approach will provide access to specialized knowledge and fresh perspectives, fostering innovation and adaptability within our organization.

Disaster Response Initiatives

We will strengthen our own capabilities by participating in State-requested deployments through the Emergency Medical Task Force (EMTF) and the Texas Interstate Fire Mutual Aid System (TIFMAS). These deployments will provide world-class training and experience for our responders to effectively handle local and large-scale all-hazards incidents.

Community Risk Reduction and Prevention

As part of our strategic outlook, we will continue to expand prevention efforts through public schools and other public avenues. Our goal here is to establish a Community Risk Reduction (CRR) program that systematically addresses the top risks in Reeves County.

Fully Implement Staffing Plans

As construction on our new stations nears completion, we will soon have the capacity to fully implement our staffing plan by hiring the additional responders originally planned for the Districts. This expansion will enhance our ability to provide more effective and timely emergency responses, ensuring improved service for the communities we serve.

Strategic Planning

In 2025, the Districts will mark their first five years of service. This year, our staff and Commissioners will begin charting the course for the next five years, ensuring a sustainable and resilient future. With a focus on growth, innovation, and excellence, we remain committed to exceeding the evolving needs of our community.
